Let's see what QUERER looks like conjugated:

QUERER = \_\_\_\_\_  
(IE)

Yo		Nosotros(as)	
Tú		Vosotros(as)	
Él / Ella / Usted		Ellas(as)/Ustedes	

**\*Notice that the endings are similar to the AR endings, only there is an \_\_\_\_\_ instead of an \_\_\_\_\_.**

One way you can use QUERER is to express what someone wants to DO.

For this, you simply conjugate querer and leave the second verb in the \_\_\_\_\_.

*\*This rule applies ANY TIME you use two verbs next to each other. You will always leave the 2<sup>nd</sup> one in the infinitive! (Yo deseo hablar. Me gusta bailar. etc.)*
